A necklace of suburbs as classy as a string of pearls rings Detroit. Each has its own equally elegant shopping district. Boutiques vie for attention, and shoppers score finds!

ornings unfold with European flair in upscale Birmingham (15 miles northwest of Detroit). Waiters serve steaming cups of cappuccino and baskets of cinnamon "gooey" rolls at Forte Restaurant's sidewalk tables along Old Woodward Avenue. It's the calm before the shopping frenzy that starts when boutiques and galleries open their doors. With this suburb's more than 300 stores, cafes, spas and salons, there's no time to lose.

At family-owned Oliver's Trendz, teenage girls hover around cascading displays of under-\$20 bead necklaces. Nearby, Caruso Caruso enshrines premium denim. Fashion mavens will find American and European designer clothing, shoes and bags at Tender. "Our customers come because they want head-to-toe fashion," says Cheryl Daskas, who owns Tender with her sister, Karen Daskas. To complete the look, Todd's Room offers manicures and pedicures and make-up re-dos.

In Plymouth, a Norman Rockwell town (25 miles west of downtown), striped awnings shade nearly 50 specialty shops in the blocks encircling Kellogg Park. Many have been fixtures for decades, and their owners greet regulars by name. From Kellogg Park, Ann Arbor Trail beckons with one-of-a-kind shops. At Creatopia, Paige Smalley, 8, meticulously paints a small pair of white-ceramic flip-flops that will decorate her bedroom.

Shops sell all sorts of treasures under original painted-tin ceilings in Victorian Northville (30 miles west of downtown). The Dancing Eye Gallery dazzles with hand-painted tiles, delicately crafted silver jewelry and home-decor conversation-starters. Gallery owner Theresa Schierloh is always looking for something different. A block west on Main, at the Northville Square complex, discover works of local artists at Starring the Gallery.

Longtime resident Debbie Luterek says, "The city has changed a lot over the years, but you can always find unique gifts here."



James Ritchie is a native of Northville and a self-taught photographer. His work is a visual expression of his interest in and appreciation of the art of 20th century automotive design; landscapes; and historic architecture, subjects and events.



Mr. Ritchie's photographs have been published on the cover of the book *BODIE: The Mines Are Looking Well* by Michael H. Piatt (North Bay Books, 2003), in calendars, on soda labels, and illustrated newspaper articles and web sites across the country and around the world. Rocco Pisto is a painter in water based media who began developing his skills while pursuing a Bachelor in Fine Arts Degree program at Eastern Michigan University over 35 years ago. His work represents a love for nature and its organic materials. Working with watercolor's unexpected and surprising results, Rocco's work is unique, spontaneous and full of life. His brush flows over the paper and creates motion, tension, and depth - building the many color layers like veils.



This passion for the painting process was influenced by such abstract expressionist icons as Jackson Pollock and Willem de Kooning. His greatest influence was his long time mentor and confidante Kingsley Calkins.

Rocco's watercolor paintings are an escape from day to day reality. Extraordinarily unique pieces, they create an exciting visual experience full of surprises and spontaneity. The intellectual side of the brain ensures that the painting has a balance of color, tone, depth, and tension, leaving the artistic side of the brain the freedom to let the watercolor media work its magic. The paintbrush becomes a musical instrument, dancing across the paper in Rocco's hand.

The Northville Art House will host its own *Antiques Roadshow* when they bring renowned appraiser Robert DuMouchelle to the Art House to assess your antiques and art! Proceeds of the event will benefit the cultural and educational programs of the Northville Art House.

Renowned appraiser, Robert DuMouchelle, and other members of the DuMouchelle staff will be available to verbally appraise your antiques and art. Robert DuMouchelle is well known from his appearances on television's PBS *Antiques Roadshow* and the family's venerable downtown Detroit gallery and auction house has served the Detroit metro area for over 80 years. Guests may bring items such as antiques, collectibles, family memorabilia, furniture and artwork. Large or fragile items should be by photograph. Coins, stamps, and jewelry will not be appraised at this event. Any history one has on an item is important, especially when bringing in artwork. Typically, the appraiser will want to know the history or provenance of the piece. The appraisers can only give out insurance values and fair market values verbally due to the lack of time.

Registration is strongly advised as we anticipate the 15 minutes appraisal time slots will fill quickly. The registration fee is \$10 per item with a limit of three items per guest. Walk-ins without prior registration will be admitted on the day of the event as time allows. 

The following are current projects and commitments Commission members are currently involved in:

Seedling Giveaway ~ The City and Township, in honor of Arbor Day, have a seedling giveaway in late April. The Township handles the details of ordering the seedlings, creating flyers and distributing to local schools to be sent home to local families. Township beautification members make sure that the event is publicized in the Northville Record. We split all costs with the Township. On the day of the giveaway, members arrive, set up, and spend about a half a day distributing the seedlings to residents.

8 Mile and Center Street Clean Up ~ This clean up needs to be done in the spring and 2 more times throughout the summer and fall. We bring our own bags etc. DPW picks up the bags and provides anything else needed like wood chips or weed killer. Approximate working time - 3-4 hours, 2 members. Four volunteers would get the job done even faster.

Planting ~ Ordering for the plantings takes place in January and February so the growers have enough time to grow what we need to fill our order. The City commission members decide what to plant in conjunction with the DDA. We currently plant the barrels throughout the downtown (excluding Town Square), Allen Terrace, Center Street, and this year we will plant out in front of City Hall. Dates are usually the last week in May and first week in June.

Barrel planting ~ Last year we planted 69 barrels for placement through the downtown. Both Township and City commission members, in conjunction with the Northville Garden Club, plant the barrels the last Thursday in May. Planting takes about 4 hours. Barrels are planted at the DPW Yard with DPW staff placing them around the City. City members return all containers to growers for recycling (1-1/2 hours). The barrels are maintained weekly all summer by Commission members, which involve deadheading and cutting back. Approx. time - 2 hours per week. Watering is done by the DPW.

Allen Terrace— Arrangements to plant at Allen Terrace are coordinated through Allen Terrace. City members and a few Garden Club volunteers plant the containers at the DPW Yard with containers transferred to Allen Terrace by DPW staff. Containers are returned to growers. Approximate time - 2 hours.

City Hall ~ Members make arrangements to have plants picked up or delivered. Approximate time - 1-2 hours, 2 members. We will also be deadheading this area on a weekly basis.

Center Street Island ~ Plants for this area are picked up by members from local growers. Members confirm with DPW that beds are plant ready and that the water system is on before planting. Four planters would be ideal. Approximate time—1-2 hours. Return containers to growers.

Beautification Awards ~ Judging for the awards takes place by members in July. Approximate time 1-2 hours. This year we will need someone to get photos of every award winner. The awards are given to the winners of both City and Township at a Rotary lunch on September 29th at the First Presbyterian Church. This luncheon is a coordinated effort with the Northville Township Beautification Commission and the Rotary Club. City commission member duties include coordinating with the Township responsibilities of the program, centerpieces, working with the City to have invitations sent out, following up with the Rotary Club, and printing and framing of certificates. The Northville Township Beautification Commission handles publicity for this event.

Griswold Road Entrance ~ A potential new project for this year is to enhance the Griswold Road entrance into Northville.

What's "In Store"

In 1850, a General Store was built in downtown Northville. In the early 2000's, after the building transitioned through many identities (car repair shop, pizza parlor, hair salon, and more), it was slated for demolition to make room for a new building. Because it was the oldest building in Downtown Northville, not to mention the last standing wooden building, The Northville Historical Society decided to adopt the structure, and move it to Mill Race Village to serve as a General Store once again, as a historical reminder of "the way things were."

Many have recently been to (or passed by) Mill Race Village and seen the building in its present state—erected, wrapped in Tyvec, and awaiting the spring construction season and eventual completion. In the meantime, work continues: handcrafted windows are being assembled, funds are being raised, and volunteers are being sought.

HOW CAN YOU HELP? 1) **"Buy" a window!** While supplies last, contributors donating \$100 will become proud "owners" of the handcrafted windows being created over this winter. 2) **Contribute** - any amount - to the construction fund.
